

Oral Test section includes questions that would stimulate the students to think and arrive at an answer based on their understanding of the concepts covered in the chapter.

1. Sources of History

— ◆◆◆ Let's Study ◆◆◆

- 1. **Medieval period of Indian history:** The period from the 9th century CE till the end of the 18th century CE is considered to be the medieval period of Indian history.
- 2. Subject matter and important factors in History: History gives a chronological, scientific and systematic account of past events. Four crucial factors in History are individuals, society, place and time.
- **3. Sources of History and their classification:** Sources of History refer to authentic evidence or proofs that enable us to understand history. These sources are classified into material sources, written sources and oral sources.
- **4. Precautions to be taken:** The authenticity of sources of History must be evaluated and critical analysis must be done before using them to study History.

MATERIAL SOURCES

- 1. Forts, monuments, and buildings: Various types of forts, monuments and buildings are material sources of history. They throw light on the architecture, economic conditions, quality of art, style of construction and standard of living in a particular period.
- 2. Coins: The coins of different rulers enable us to learn about their period, governance, religious ideas, personal details, language in use etc. We also learn about the financial transactions, economic conditions, advancement in metallurgy etc. from the coins.
- **3. Inscription:** It helps us to understand language, script, social life of a period.
- **4. Examples of material sources:** *Chaityas, Viharas*, temples, churches, mosques, *mukbaras*, *gurudwaras*, sculptures, wells, village boundaries, weapons, utensils, ornaments, clothes, decorative articles, toys, implements, musical instruments etc.

> WRITTEN SOURCES

- 1. Forms of written sources: We learn about significant historical events from *bhurjapatras*, religious manuscripts, treatises, edicts, decrees, biographies, paintings, judicial verdicts and orders, travelogues of foreign travellers, tavarikh, bakhar etc.
- **2. Language:** The writing styles of scripts (Devanagari, Arabic, Persian, Modi etc.) and varieties of different languages throw light on the language used in a particular period.
- **3. Use of written sources:** We learn about the food items, attire, conventions and rules of conduct, festivals and life of people from written sources.

> ORAL SOURCES

- **1. Examples of oral sources:** Folk literature which is traditionally passed on from generation to generation aids in understanding history. Some examples of oral sources are *owis*, folk songs, *powadas*, folk tales, legends, myths, gatha, *shlokas*, *abhangas* etc.
- **2.** *Powada* of Tanaji: A *powada* composed by Tulashidas Shahir portrays the Kondhana campaign. It contains character sketches of Tanaji and others.

PROCESS OF WRITING HISTORY

- 1. Based on sources of History: History is written with the help of the material, written and oral sources.
- 2. Rewriting history: History has to be rewritten when new sources and information come to light.

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EVALUATING THE SOURCES OF HISTORY

1. **Precautions to be taken:** It is essential to take certain precautions before using any source of history. These precautions are as follows:

- (i) We have to examine the authenticity and determine the quality of sources.
- (ii) We need to study the integrity of writers and the political pressures on them.
- (iii) The information has to be verified with the help of other contemporary sources.
- (iv) The information has to be seen in a proper perspective.
- (v) The sources have to be subjected to a critical analysis.
